Dear Parents,






Dance

A-Level Politics Trip to the Houses of Parliament

On Friday 13th January, Sixth Form Government and Politics students were able to visit one of the most famous buildings in the world - the Houses of Parliament in Westminster, and find out more about British Politics and its long history.

First, we visited the Robing Room where the monarch prepares for the State Opening of Parliament, then crossed into the ornate Royal Gallery. The walls were lined with huge murals of Nelson at Trafalgar and Wellington at Waterloo. Great stacks of 'White Paper' government documents also lined the side-tables and we were even allowed to look through the policies that the Houses were working on and would soon pass into law.

As Parliament does not sit on a Friday, we were then able to see the luxury of the House of Lords from the floor itself. I was struck by the elaborate nature of the House and the gilded panels that made it look like a church or palace. Out into the Central Lobby, we were met with mosaics of the nation's Patron Saints and the detailed stonework which can often be seen in the background of news channel interviews. We then ventured through the division lobbies (where MPs actually cast their votes) which were lined with copies of Hansard and into the House of Commons. The difference between the two chambers was stark. The Commons' muted green were much less astounding than the rich red and gold of 'The Other Place.' It felt incredible to be on the floor of where the most influential politicians, all the way from Churchill to Blair, once stood.

We then rounded off the tour by visiting Westminster Hall, the oldest part of the Palace dating all the way back to 1097. It was once a court holding the trials of King Charles I, Guy Fawkes, and Thomas More, then a tennis court for Henry VIII, but we now know it as where Elizabeth II lay in state, and where Dr. Wilkin took our photograph, of course! At the end of the day, we took part in a workshop discussing the British electoral systems and how representation works in Britain today. Overall, the experience was incredible and really opened our eyes to the wider view of British Politics. However, I think one of our main takeaways will be how small the two chambers really are, in spite of them looking much larger on TV!





Year 9 Art and Textiles Students' Collaborative Artwork inspired by Alma Thomas





Alma Thomas (1891-1978) was a painter and art educator. Her work has been the inspiration for a collaborative extracurricular art project for our Year 9 Art and Textiles students. We have taken inspiration from this pioneering black female artist, who was the first black woman to have a solo exhibition at New York's 'Whitney Museum' and exhibited her paintings at the White House three times.

. Thomas' abstractions have been compared with Byzantine mosaics and the Pointillist technique of Georges Seurat, yet her work is distinctive and exciting. Her signature abstract painting style often consisted of broad, mosaic like patches of vibrant colour applied in concentric circles, which has particularly captured our imaginations. Thomas was inspired by the colour and light that she observed in nature. Her paintings have a spiritual quality to them, especially 'Resurrection,' 1966, (pictured above) which was acquired by Michelle Obama to hang in the White House.



Currently, students are working to add wording to their piece, inspired by the circle and the meanings associated with the it. The circle is a universal motif with extensive symbolism. It represents the notions of totality, wholeness, original perfection, the infinite, eternity, timelessness, all cyclic movement. The circle is an endless line, having no beginning and no end, which symbolises eternity or God. In some cultures, when people want to come together and support one another, they form a circle. The circle represents unity, community, completeness, infinity and eternity, never-ending existence, perfection, protection, the universe and the heavens. Adding to the collaborative piece continues, as students across four classes in Art and Textiles engage with this special shared creative endeavour. It is hoped that the piece will also represent the collective creative abilities of our students and the special community of our school.

Now in its fifth year, the Young Artists' Summer Show is a free, open submission exhibition for students aged 4–19 studying in the UK. Artworks are judged by a panel of artists and arts professionals, with selected artworks displayed online and on-site at the Royal Academy of Arts.

Our school is registered for our students to submit entries to the competition. Get involved!

How can you enter? Submitting artwork is completely free and is done online. If you're 12 your parent/guardian or your teacher will need to enter for you; if you're 13 or over you can submit artwork yourself.

Each student can submit one artwork and there is no theme. When you enter, the Royal Academy will ask for an image of your artwork plus some information about the piece such as title, size, and a little text about the artwork and why you made it. Your artwork will be seen by the Royal Academy's panel of judges and the selected pieces will be shown in their online exhibition. Some of the artworks will also be shown at the Royal Academy of Arts.

Closing date for submissions is 29 March 2023.

How does the judging work? All of the artworks submitted are viewed and judged by a panel of experienced and passionate artists and arts professionals and they work together to select which pieces will be shown online and which will be shown at the Royal Academy. Judges are looking for imagination, originality and skill and seek to represent young artists across the breadth of the UK.

Judges are looking for imagination, originality and skill. Although many great artists 'copy' in creative ways, artworks that closely reproduce another artist's work or ideas won't be selected.

What kind of Artworks are accepted? The artwork can be made using any material; it can be a painting, sculpture, photograph, installation, video, drawing, or a combination. It could be a textile piece, video, performance piece, or surprise the RA!

There is no theme, so artworks can be of any subject and the RA doesn't mind when you made the artwork as long as you are between 4-19 years old when you submit it. We also welcome collaborative pieces made by more than one student, a whole class, a whole year group or even a whole school!

Each submission can include a short written statement, written by the artist themselves (if possible) and can include why they created the work and what it means to them.

Prizes Prizes are awarded each year for inspiring artworks, as chosen by the President of the Royal Academy. You can also vote for your favourite artwork in our annual People's Choice Award.



Our students will create an illustration for specially designed Coronation benches to mark the Coronation of King Charles III. Over the coming weeks, we will invite students to work through Coronation learning resources, bringing the Coronation to life and exploring it as a moment of transition. The competition wants students to think about the values and symbols which

they wish to define the new era.

Fifteen winning schools will then work with an artist from 'Wild in Art' to bring their designs to life, each creating an illustrated bench which will be displayed in pride of place at the Tower of London during the Coronation celebrations in May 2023.

The winning benches will then be transported to the winning schools, where they will remain forever as a lasting leg-



Criminology Conference

On 30th November, a group of A Level Psychology students travelled to London to attend a criminology conference. Our day was filled with talks from many different people in the field of criminology, informing us about the very interesting findings of their individual research on topic areas such as domestic abuse and male violence and also educating us on the psychology that is used within the police force.



The talks that were particularly interesting were the real-life stories from two rehabilitated offenders. The first talk being from the "Mafia Princess" who told her story of running the Italian Mafia, and detailed the consequences she experienced as a result of her behaviour in both the Italian and the UK criminal justice system. The second talk was from a man who suffered a brain injury which led him to become highly aggressive, causing him to eventually turn to a lifestyle of crime as a graffiti gang leader. Both speakers opened up the floor to questions, which allowed us to ask deeper questions about their experiences within the criminal justice system and their new role in helping others to avoid a life of crime.

Overall, the day was very enjoyable and enlightening. This new experience gave us, as A Level students, insight into university style learning and strengthened our understanding of criminal psychology.

Year 10 PSHE Assessment Task

Our Year 10 Students were recently set the following challenge for their assessment.

Year 10 PSHE **Economic Wellbeing**

Demonstrate your understanding of what it means to be well informed about debt.

Here are some examples of the responses:

"Search around—Don't accept the first deal you are offered. If one APR is high, you should be very careful.

Repay quickly- If the interest rate is high, paying off debt slowly can work out to be very expensive. Keep a good credit rating—Lenders use credit ratings to judge how risky you are. Good credit ratings will help persuade the lender to lend to you at lower interest rates."

"Debt is the term used to describe the act of needing to pay back money that you have borrowed. Of course it isn't that simple because in some cases, people can't afford or manage to pay back debt which can then lead to multiple problems surrounding that person and their family.

So if you take out a certain amount of money and pay it back within a suitable time period, then essentially you are borrowing money for free. However, if you fail to pay it back in time then your bank will start to charge you interest.


March Book Fair








Child and Family Counselling Services

Parents are now able to access direct support for their child by referring them into the safe hands of our Child and Family Counselling Services (CFCS). We have a team of highly experienced Counsellors, Specialist Child and Adolescent Counsellors and Play Therapists available within the counselling team



CFCS provides therapy to children, young people and families. We support many different issues such as:

- Self-harm
- Identity
- Anxiety

- Bullying
- Bereavement
- Parental separation and family issues or conflict.

The pathway is overseen by our Head of Child and Family Counselling Services, who is supported by a team that are both passionate about and dedicated to the wellbeing of children and young people. The team has achieved very positive and reparative outcomes for children and families.

What can you expect?

After an initial contact, we will arrange an assessment to explore the issues your child may be experiencing and will then identify which model best supports the difficulty your child may be facing.
