

Dear Parents,

What an eventful term it has been! From the point of view of the students, there have been all sorts of exciting things going on that you can read about in this edition.

From the staff's point of view, our two days of Ofsted inspection, whilst not exactly an enjoyable 'highlight', certainly dominated our thoughts for a short but intensive period. I would like to thank all of my colleagues, the students and you parents for the support you showed during the inspection. We do not yet know exactly when the report will be published, but it will of course be shared with you when it appears.

It hasn't all been plain sailing this term, I'm sorry to say. We have seen the unwelcome return of mindless damage in some of the toilets and we continue to be presented with issues involving social media by children from younger and younger year groups. The former problem is usually caused by one or two students who selfishly ruin the situation for everyone else; it is usually isolated and doesn't last long.

The latter, unfortunately, seems to be no respecter of age, background or academic ability. We can have assemblies in school, outside speakers, PSHE lessons and all sorts of other activities, but the fact is that much of what goes on with social media happens when our students are not under our supervision.

I would ask you, as ever, to be vigilant and not naive about your child's phone usage: they are much smarter about these things than most of us and well able to evade scrutiny if determined to do so. Despite arguments that might be put forward to the contrary (mainly by those with a vested interest), I grow more and more convinced that, one way or another, social media is either the cause of, or a contributing factor in, many of the wellbeing problems experienced by our students. It is an influence more pervasive and more powerful than school, and in some cases than family. In our parentschool partnership, we can only try our best to be the most positive, most powerful influence in the lives of your children, our students, but we need to recognise that this is getting harder to achieve. I say this not to depress or frighten you, but to encourage you to stay alert.

On a lighter note, the weather is warming up and we have two weeks to recharge before the final term of the year. I wish you a very holy and restful Easter.

Alex Burghart MP Visit

Last week, the local MP for Brentwood and Ongar, Alex Burghart, visited our school to speak to Government and Politics students for an insight into the political process and workings of Parliament. Having become an MP in 2017, he explained how in his political career he has seen remarkable change regarding the UK facing, what will soon to be viewed as historical, constitutional challenge. He spoke of his Party's pursuit to have the UK leave the EU effectively, which was not an easy task given the constitutional implications. Students were interested to discover what an MP's schedule looked like and Alex, having been Parliamentary Private Secretary, offered analysis of his work in both the Commons on a national basis and within his constituency, partaking in local work on Fridays. His assessment of the role MPs play in representation was of worth to us as within our studies we look at whether the Burkean model of Representation is still upheld by the politicians that serve us. Wider conversations about the media's role in politics were also covered which was extremely interesting when put in the context of how the media can shape our perception of government. Both Year 12 and 13 students found this visit engaging as we could get a specific insight into Parliament and have our burning questions answered.



Hearing first and second hand accounts make these historical tragedies clearer to us. Making sure the next generation doesn't forget these events is vital. I found it bitter-sweet to hear similar stories from my family, as although there was so much pain, we weren't alone. Sue's talk was both informative and emotional. I think we all walked away better informed than before.



UCAS Discovery 2023

On Monday 27th March, Year 12 and the Sixth Form team visited the UCAS Discovery 2023 exhibition held at the ExCeL in London. This annual event aims to inform students and help guide them into a variety of pathways which are on offer to them after leaving Sixth Form. The exhibition consisted of over 100 universities, colleges and apprenticeship employers: from the University of Oxford and the University of London Institute in Paris, to the Royal Air Force and Dyson Institute of Engineering and Technology. There were also live expert talks which took place for careers concerning STEM, Humanities, Nursing and Law. Some students even participated in Q&As in order to gain a greater insight into what they needed for their upcoming UCAS applications.



We found this event to be very insightful and accommodating to any questions we had with regard to our university applications and courses that we may choose to undertake. This event also helped us to understand that whilst there are many universities and course choices on offer, this isn't the only pathway available to us. It was useful to also discuss and be educated about matters outside of university choices such as: bursaries, student accommodation, forthcoming open days, and webinars and lectures being held which will deepen our knowledge and understanding of our chosen subjects. We would like to thank the Sixth Form team for organising this event to support our Post 18 options and we look forward to using what we have learned from this event to support our UCAS applications next term.

Guy's Hospital Trip





Since October, three Year 11 students (Lili, Poppy and Tilly) have been receiving mentoring, via Teams, by clinical scientists at Guy's Hospital. On March 7th, they were invited to meet their mentors in person, visit the laboratories, meet the Chief Scientific Officer and the Chief Executive of Synnovis, the biggest pathology provider in Europe. The students had a positive experience at the hospital. They followed a sample from a patient who was getting ready for a kidney transplant and learnt what the clinical team had to do to ensure that the kidney wasn't rejected. They then went into cancer genetics and saw the chromosomes inside patient cancer cells. Every cell had different chromosomes as they were at different stages of the cell cycle. The students found this interesting, as it links into what they learn at KS4. They also got a chance to load gels with DNA and use some of the equipment in the laboratory. They were presented with certificates of participation in the programme and given goody bags. They all have the opportunity to apply for the Healthcare Scientist Apprenticeship programme with Synnovis, either before or after their A levels, depending on which path they choose.


Michael Morpurgo Live Virtual Visit

Thursday 2nd March was World Book Day and the perfect day for Years 7 and 8 to take part in a live virtual visit from children's author Sir Michael Morpurgo.

The event, hosted by Readathon, was watched across several locations in school.

Having celebrated Michael Morpurgo Month throughout February, students were familiar with his many books and charitable work but it was fantastic to hear first hand about what inspires him to write. He spoke in particular about 'War Horse' which is forty years old this year.

Throughout the event, the audience were asked a number of multiple choice questions which we had fun answering. These included how many books Morpurgoi had written, which war featured in War Horse, and how long it took to create a puppet for the stage adaptation of the book.



We learned that if Michael had not been a writer, he would have liked to have become an actor like his parents.

We also learned that the charity he started with his wife, 'Farms for City Children,' now has three sites and gives thousands of inner city children a year an opportunity to experience farming and countryside life.

Since the Covid-19 pandemic, Morpurgo has turned his attention to writing poetry, and to end the session, he read a poem from a book inspired by Camille Saint-Saëns' 'The Carnival of the Animals' called 'Tortoises.'

	"Michael Morpurgo is a well-known British author, poet, and playwright who has written over 150 books for children and young adults. His writing often explores themes of family, friendship, war, and the natural world. He is best known for his book 'War Horse,' which was adapted into a successful stage play and later a film.
	My class and I discovered this on Thursday 2nd March, when Morpurgo visited us virtually. We started off with an introduction followed by a few polls, and then on to chatting about Michael's most popular book, 'War Horse.' We looked at a painting of a beautiful stallion and heard about his inspiration for the book; how he met the veterans of World War 1 and remembered the suffering of the horses. The author stated that he liked to base his books on historic events to make them seem more real.
	After a few more polls, we jumped to the Q&A session. One school enquired if there was a book he wished he had written. His reply was that it would have been 'The Elephant's Child.' Michael told us it is the "best book in the world!" It was written by Rudyard Kipling. Morpurgo declared that he loved Kipling's books and would really recommend us to read them. Soon after this, Morpurgo treated us with a snippet of 'War Horse,' and I really engaged with this. I look forward to reading this book soon!
	At the end of the online seminar, Michael read to us one of his poems that he wrote during the lockdown period. The flow of the poem was extremely pleasing, and the context was gripping.
	Overall, Michael Morpurgo's work has had a significant impact on children's literature and has brought new vocabulary into their minds. I enjoyed the webinar and cannot wait for the next one!"





Janaki Ammal



There is even a flower named after her, a delicate bloom in pure white called Magnolia Kobus Janaki Ammal.

Child and Family Counselling Services

Parents are now able to access direct support for their child by referring them into the safe hands of our Child and Family Counselling Services (CFCS). We have a team of highly experienced Counsellors, Specialist Child and Adolescent Counsellors and Play Therapists available within the counselling team who work in our specially adapted therapy rooms.

We offer support to children, young people and parents through talking, play and art therapy.



CFCS provides therapy to children, young people and families. We support many different issues such as:

- Self-harm
- Identity
- Anxiety

- Bullying
- Bereavement
- Parental separation and family issues or conflict.

The pathway is overseen by our Head of Child and Family Counselling Services, who is supported by a team that are both passionate about and dedicated to the wellbeing of children and young people. The team has achieved very positive and reparative outcomes for children and families.

What can you expect?

After an initial contact, we will arrange an assessment to explore the issues your child may be experiencing and will then identify which model best supports the difficulty your child may be facing.

At the suggestion of my daughter's school a referral was made to **BCCS** and it was then that I met one of their counsellors. After months of unanswered questions and "hitting brick walls" I finally had answers, structure and a profound understanding of how a small little girl's mind works.

For me, there has been nothing so worrying as watching your child struggle and the **BCCS** counsellor's help has enabled me to help her for which I will be forever grateful.
