

Dear Parents/Carers,

This has been a very busy term for our older students, with UCAS applications, 'early entry' tests and interviews for medicine, Oxbridge and other competitive courses. There have been assessments for Year 13 in September and autumn exams for Years 11 and 13 in December: spare a thought not only for the students but also for the teachers who have to mark this quantity of material! It's all part of acclimatising our students to the demands of public exams, as well as giving them accurate data on which to base their future plans and work schedules.

All this preparation pays off. In the summer of 2023, our GCSE value-added score was the highest of all state schools in Essex, including the grammar schools. This achievement puts us in the top 1% of schools in the country for the difference we make to each student from Year 7 to Year 11. Even in absolute terms (i.e. raw results with no allowance for the starting point of each student), the Times Parent Power Survey puts us third among non-selective state schools in the Eastern Region of England. 'Teach to the top, then support' will continue to be our mantra, as it has been for the last 12 years.

In amongst all this focused hard work, there have been numerous opportunities for enrichment. The Lille trip for French was a highlight, as was the Kairos retreat for our Sixth Formers; the Dance Show traditionally rounds off the autumn term and our sports teams have had a full calendar of fixtures. History students have been to the 'Secret' Nuclear Bunker as part of their GCSE studies and geographers have enjoyed both interviewing shoppers in Chelmsford and wading into cold water in Epping Forest. I hope you enjoy reading about the many activities that your children have been engaged in this term and that you have a happy and restful Christmas break.


KS3 Debate Club



Food Technology

KS3 Update

This term, our students have been introduced to making pizza from scratch and producing chicken wraps/ fajitas too. Those who did not wish to use chicken have used Quorn or haloumi and the results have been enjoyed by all. Some classes were able to make muffins and biscuits in the week before the Christmas holidays and they were excited about these lessons. Students continue to be very engaged in Food Technology lessons in the lower school. They send us pictures on Teams of recipes they have tried again once they return home and explain how they have managed to feed their whole family. Some have changed our recipes slightly. One student altered our carrot muffins into a large carrot cake and served it with custard. Another mixed RE and Food Technology together and made the stable at Bethlehem and the Holy Family. Students have also been invited to be part of a Christmas competition, celebrating the foods which they themselves cook and eat over the festive period. They were asked to cook or prepare the food, photograph it, upload it to Teams and explain to us why it is important to their family. This is also proving popular.

Look out next term for our Valentine themed biscuit making competition which we are running again, building on the success of last year.

Year 10 Geography Field Trip

On Monday 4th December, Year 10 went on a GCSE Geography field trip to carry out our River Field Investigation which makes up part of our GCSE grade. We attended Epping Forest Field Centre, where we investigated the changes in Loughton Brook River. Loughton Brook is a small river that runs all the way through Epping Forest. Each geography class was taken to separate locations along the river to measure its width, depth, and velocity. We were then split into small groups, and each was assigned a certain part of the river to study and collect data from. We later then shared and compared our results with the other groups.

To enable us to complete this investigation about how characteristics of rivers change, we were given specific equipment to use in the various tests. For example, a meter ruler to measure the river's depth, a cork to measure the velocity and a tape measure to measure its width. As a year group, we took part in a lesson beforehand about rivers and learnt some interesting facts about their shape and how they are formed. This was useful to us and widened our knowledge of rivers and their processes.

Throughout the day, we were encouraged to recognise our surroundings and identify the changes that our environment is experiencing due to climate change, along with using any skills we knew prior to the trip or learnt from the day. Overall, it was an enjoyable day putting our river knowledge into practice. We embedded the skills that are needed to move forward in our Geography GCSE to help us get the best marks.



BUCHS Bees

Over the past term, our BUCHS Bees group has been busy harvesting some honey from our hives and preparing the bees for winter. This has been the first year we have been able to take honey from the hives and although it has been a tricky year for beekeepers given the colder weather and smaller honey harvests, we are so excited to have been able to produce our first honey jars while leaving the bees with plenty of honey to keep them going over winter.



Honey extraction





Early on in the Autumn term, we extracted our honey from the hives; collecting Super frames, uncapping the comb and using the centrifuge extractor to spin the honey out. We then needed to filter the honey to remove wax and capping material. We were fortunate to be able to borrow some equipment from the Chelmsford Beekeeping group to be able to do so.

Insulating the bees for winter

As the weather started to get colder, our next job was to insulate the hives for winter to improve the chances of our colonies surviving. Mr Overton-Smith came in to help us check over the hives while Mr Foster is off, and we then set to work getting the hives in the best condition we could for the colder weather. We were surprised to hear that it isn't usually the cold that is the biggest threat for colonies, but instead the water that forms inside hives as a result of condensation. Therefore, we have insulated our hives by filling the top super boxes with felt, sawdust and bubble wrap to ensure that the hives stay warm and dry and our bees are tucked up as best they can be for the winter season.

Eke building




With our bees tucked up, we then moved on to building some ekes; smaller frames that are used to eke the hive lid up a few inches and provide space for fondant to be supplied to the bees. Although we have left each of the colonies with their own honey supplies for winter, we will also be giving the bees some additional fondant to ensure they have sufficient sugars to help them survive the winter as a strong colony. We learnt some new skills in sawing and joining the wood to build the frames, at the same time as saving ourselves some money building them rather than buying them pre-made. We were relieved to see them fit squarely onto the queen excluder templates at the end of our session!

Our first BUCHS Honey

In the lead up to Christmas, we organised a fundraiser to help us raise the money that we need to set the BUCHS Bees group up for the next year. We each designed some labels for the jar and these were taken to Mr Foster for the winning design to be chosen. Well done to Felicity for designing the winning label that has then been incorporated into the design for our jars.

Keeping one jar of honey aside to take to The Grange and present to our Ursuline Sisters, we had three jars of honey from the hives that we were able to raffle. We were astonished at the support that we received from students, parents and staff and are really thankful to everyone who bought a raffle ticket and helped towards the items that we have been able to purchase!





We have been able to order new bee suits to double the number of students that are able to help tend to the hives, Nuc boxes to go with each of our hives (to allow us to manage the colonies in Spring when numbers increase and colonies swarm,) as well as new Super boxes, frames and foundation to allow us to increase honey production next year. We could not have done this without the support of those at home, so a huge thank you!

Kairos 2023

We were pleased to relaunch our Sixth Form retreat, Kairos. Having taken place at Worth Abbey for many years prior to the pandemic, we were welcomed back to the Benedictine Monastery in Sussex. The students fully entered into the spirit of the 2-day retreat, exploring the theme of 'Salt and Light' through testimony, reflection, activities, and quiet time.

Our fantastic students have said of the retreat: "Kairos has ... also allowed me to connect with God in a new way. The experience has taught me a lot." "Kairos allowed me to reflect on myself as well as giving more time to God. I think this was my moment where I could share my light." "[My favourite part of the retreat was the] Em maus walk because it was nice to take a breather and enjoy scenery while talking about our Faith and God." "I learnt that there is more to life than one would normally think.

It was wonderful to take such a fantastic group of young people and a privilege to accompany them on their personal faith journey. Mr Walker and Ms Gillespie are excited to take a larger group next year. If you are interested in Kairos 2024, please come and talk to either of us.





History

Suffragette Campaign

On Monday 4th December, Year 8 historians took part in a Suffragette Campaign Competition. As part of our curriculum, they have been learning about women over 30 gaining the right to vote in 1918 and those over 21 being granted the vote in 1928. They have been studying the significance of the women's movements: the NUWSS, the Suffragists and the WSPU, the Suffragettes and the role of the First World War. Their learning inspired them to write poems, raps and make models. One student, Carlotta, even made a replica of Emily Wilding Davison's scarf! All students voted for the finalists from their form group and they presented their work in the Year 8 assembly. There were some amazing performances. Students showed their work and spoke confidently about what they had learned. The History Team were so proud of their enthusiasm and hard work. 




Year 7 Retreats

Harvest Festival Update and Christmas Toy Appeal






Twelve Books of Christmas Challenge


