



Dear Parents,

This Newsletter reaches you at the height of the exam season, which has been extended this year by the authorities to provide bigger gaps between exams, as a COVID precaution. Good luck to all the students who will have a busy half term preparing hard for the resumption of exams after the Platinum Bank Holiday weekend.

One of the points that emerged from students' responses to our survey in January was the post-COVID absence of community activities in the autumn term 2021. I think we can safely say that the BUCHS community has changed that completely, as you will see from this Newsletter. Co-curricular activities are back in full swing and charity fundraising events have taken place more or less weekly for some time now.

We are firmly back in school and have re-established our expectations and routines, particularly regarding academic matters. The same is true in terms of uniform and behaviour, though we are still looking for your support in upholding our high standards regarding jewellery, hairstyles and skirt length. If we work together, I'm sure we can prevent either students or teachers having to waste time talking about those issues, rather than more important things. If in doubt, please check the uniform regulations in your child's planner.

A number of important projects are contributing to the upkeep of our ageing buildings. Having finished the very costly upgrading of our heating and fire alarm systems, we are now dealing with our pitched roofs, some of which have not been repaired since they were made good after German bomb damage in the war! In the coming months we will replace the windows in the A block, dating from 1964, which are environmentally very inefficient.

At the same time, we will replace old lighting with LED systems, again to bring us up to efficient modern standards. We have to bid every year for big capital projects of this kind, and it is testament to our School Business Manager, Mrs Cowler, that we have been so successful recently. Unfortunately such projects are largely hidden, from the students' point of view, and are part of our duty to maintain a safe environment. Money for more obvious benefits, such as improving classrooms and toilets, has to be found from our normal budget, which is a big challenge, with energy costs rocketing and inflation affecting schools as well as families.

Later this term and in September, please look out for the information that we will be providing about our assessment and reporting routines. We have taken a great deal of care designing systems that we believe are both educationally sound and helpful to you and the students, some of which we will be piloting with certain year groups before the holiday. The roll-out for all years will start in September, so information will be provided and an opportunity to ask questions about this important aspect of our school life.

We were delighted to participate in The Baytree Shopping Centre's School Art Competition to celebrate Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022.






We have District Athletics coming up. Preparation is well under way for students to compete for selection. The best way for this to happen is for attendance at extra curricular athletics.

### Debate Club

Debate Club is run by the Year 12 Politics Prefect and Year 12 Politics and History students.

We hold a debate each half-term for KS3 and KS4 students in which we discuss contemporary political issues which directly affect our students.

For example, at KS3, we have discussed whether free school meals should be introduced for all school students as a means of combatting the childhood obesity epidemic, which the majority voted for. And at KS4, we discussed the possibility of lowering the voting age to 16 in the UK. Those taking part concluded lowering the voting age to 16 could result in an increase in younger people participating in elections and that, consequently, the government could take the needs of the youth of the UK into greater consideration.

In Debate Club, we encourage students to think for themselves, to develop their own informed opinions on topics, and to meet with other students who share the same drive for debating political issues.


### BTEC Performing Arts

### Our New French Friends

Earlier this year, a lady named Lisa Talma wrote to us here at BUCHS. She was a pupil here and left in 1984. Her life took her to France, following a University degree studying the language at The University of Sussex and she settled in the French Alps. She has been a teacher there for many years and remembers her Ursuline Days with fondness and keeps in touch with some of her old classmates. In France, her pupils don't wear a uniform and Lisa keeps her Ursuline blazer in her classroom for them to see and appreciate some of the differences between French and English schools. The French children have noticed many differences already. One being that they seem to all learn to ski, a natural result of living in the Alps! Also that they learn foreign languages from a young age, so their English is already quite good.

Lisa asked if we would like to make contact and we jumped at the chance!

The link so far:

We have sent a package of display work to Lisa's school based on the topic of 'My Town,' our most recent Year 7 topic. All of our work is in French and the plan is for Lisa's work to be done in English by her pupils. Lisa's pupils were thrilled with the work we sent and have put it on display in the corridor. At my request, they also judged which pieces they felt were the best from our Year 7 pupils and have sent us handmade certificates to be presented to the lucky girls at the end of May. Lisa's pupils soon wrote letters back and we too have put some of these on display in the T corridor, including a letter from Lisa explaining where she lives and works.

As May half term approaches, we have now managed to allocate a pen pal to every pupil in Year 7. There are fewer pupils at the school in France, so some pupils might be lucky enough to have 2 pen pals! We have written letters to our new pen pals based on the topic of 'My School' and these are almost ready to be posted. Some Year 8 pupils, continuing with GCSE French in Year 9 have also asked for a pen pal. As this is a 'school to school' project, all letters and all communication will go through the two teachers; myself and Lisa in France. It has been very exciting to receive real letters. There is nothing like it, and some of our pupils have never received such a letter before due to the ways in which we communicate these days.

This link will be purely letter writing for now and may include a video link up in the future so that we can see the other school. Many language teachers will cite their reason for learning a language as having pen pals back when they were at school and it is exactly the same for us here at BUCHS.

Recently, Lisa asked if we would like to be part of a cook book she is producing with her pupils this year and once again we have been happy to agree. The pupils studying both Food and French here at BUCHS will be the first to be invited to submit recipes and we can help translate them before we post them.





This will also be run as a competition, but the French school will be the judges! It's an exciting link, made stronger and more meaningful by the fact that Lisa was a pupil here herself.







### Year 9 Assembly

It was the turn of 9J this week and the theme for the week was 'The Peace of Christ.' We chose to talk about CAFOD. CAFOD stands for 'The Catholic Agency For Overseas Development.

We began with a prayer:

**Creator God, who made our beautiful world,  
appointed us as its guardians and gifted us with  
everything we need,  
forgive us for the times we cause it harm; for the  
times our way of life affects our neighbours. Inspire  
us to care for the environment; to help rebuild lives  
and communities; to share in the griefs and  
anxieties, joys and hopes of all your people,  
so that all your creation may flourish. Amen**

We talked about the fact that 'in these uncertain times, where we are slowly recovering from the impact of the pandemic, and when the news seem to have only negative reports to give us, we must remember that people are standing shoulder to shoulder and making a difference, positively influencing the lives of others.'

We looked at the CAFOD website and discovered that: 'CAFOD was born when a team led by Jacquie Stuyt came together with others from the National Board of Catholic Women, the Catholic Women's League and the Union of Catholic Mothers to organise the first Family Fast Day in 1960. Due to the number of collections taking place across the dioceses, two years later, the Bishop's Conference of England and Wales registered CAFOD as an official charity.

Jacquie and the other volunteers responded to an appeal from the people of the Caribbean island of Dominica where children were starving to help raise funds for a mother and baby clinic.

As well as funding the new clinic, the project also helped people to make a living for themselves, including providing water and teaching people how to plant vegetable gardens. This determination to reach those most in need and help people fulfil their potential is still at the heart of CAFOD's mission.

Today, CAFOD has global reach. They are part of one of the largest aid networks in the world. Because of their global reach and local presence, they have the potential to reach everyone. Local experts help some of the most difficult to reach people in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East. Whether it's a single mother living in a remote area, a teenage boy living in a war zone, or a disabled father and daughter who are discriminated against, they help anyone regardless of faith, gender or ethnicity.



### Year 9 Assembly Continued

CAFOD has the potential to reach so many people because they are a member of a global Church network with a presence in 165 countries.

Recently, our school has been involved in helping the people of Ukraine by donating items to a collection. CAFOD are also working with other organisations in Ukraine and neighbouring countries in the following ways:

- Support in paying for rented accommodation, bedding and essential furniture.
- Providing electronic tablets and internet for children so that they can continue attending the online classes delivered by their schools in Ukraine.
- Helping people access medical consultations (physical and psychological) and medicines.
- Providing supplies for soup kitchens and food distributions to those in need.

Pope Francis has called for political leaders to make "a great examination of conscience before God, who is the God of peace and not of war."

In his Angelus address on 6th March, Pope Francis said: "I make a heartfelt appeal for humanitarian corridors to be genuinely secured, and for aid to be guaranteed and access facilitated to the besieged areas, in order to offer vital relief to our brothers and sisters oppressed by bombs and fear."

We then suggested ways in which Year 9 could help, which included being aware, finding out the facts, donating at Church and even donating to our collection in assembly. This past year, 9J have been bringing in items to donate to local foodbanks every week. We are proud to say this has continued and today is no exception. We are collecting items from Year 9 students and form tutors and directing them to those who need them.

Our reading had a key message, underpinning what we said in the assembly:

A reading from Philippians 4:4-9

"May you always be joyful in your union with the Lord. I say it again: rejoice!

Show a gentle attitude towards everyone. The Lord is coming soon. Don't worry about anything, but in all your prayers ask God for what you need, always asking him with a thankful heart."

We chose the song 'Man in The Mirror' by Michael Jackson for a moment of reflection as the lyrics call you to 'take a look at yourself and make a change' which we thought was very appropriate.

We finished with this prayer which we said together:

**Father of love, hear our prayer.  
 Help us to know Your will  
 and to follow it with courage and faith.  
 Accept the offering of ourselves,  
 all our thoughts, words, deeds, and sufferings.  
 May our lives be spent giving You glory.  
 Give us the strength to follow Your call,  
 so that Your Truth may live in our hearts  
 and bring peace to us and to those we meet,  
 for we believe in Your Love.  
 We make our prayer through Christ our Lord,**

**Amen.**

## Statutory School Appeals Could you be a Volunteer Panel Member?

Appeal Panels are convened to examine cases in which parents wish to contest either the refusal by a school's Admissions Authority to admit a child, or a Governing Body's decision to permanently exclude a child.

Essex County Council Statutory Appeals Team are currently looking for panel members for both Admission Appeals and Exclusion Appeals. Each case is heard by 3 panel members, including one who is trained to act as a chairperson. A trained clerk is also present and gives advice on the law and regulations to make sure panel members follow the right procedures. Do you have the ability to listen, to be impartial without being swayed by emotion, can appreciate both sides of an argument and are able to make reasoned decisions, you may be just the person we are looking for. Can you spare a few days or more each year to participate in this rewarding and interesting task?

Previous specialist knowledge of this field is not essential, we are looking for people who have time to consider the issues properly. We offer full training and will reimburse travel and subsistence expenses, although at present Appeal Hearings take place via Zoom..

### Author Visit


