"32 Years with the Ursuline - as a pupil and then a teacher - providing much fertile ground for reflection and humour!" this year's talk by Pat McCarthy at the Annual Reunion on Sunday, 19 May, 2019

Pat McCarthy was born Patricia Mary Flynn in 1954. Her sister Sheila is three years older than her and she followed her to the Brentwood Ursuline in 1965, where she was extremely happy for seven years.

She completed a Secretarial Course in the Sixth Form and after one year with her local Council went to the Trent Polytechnic, Nottingham to train to be a teacher. She worked at Canon Palmer Catholic High School from 1976-1988 with breaks for childcare. She and her husband, Gerry, have two children (an Ilford Ursuline girl, Erin and a Campion boy, Barney) and two small grandchildren.

In 1988 she moved to the Ilford Ursuline High School and retired from the Ursuline Academy Ilford in 2013 as Vice Principal.

Annual Reunion - 2018

held on Sunday, 20 May, 2018 at The Brentwood Ursuline Convent High School

The Chairman welcomed everyone and introduced the Committee The outgoing Membership Secretary, Ann Camp, was presented with a bouquet of flowers. Lucy Scully has taken over from her as Membership Secretary. The names of past pupils who sadly had died recently were read out, and these are shown elsewhere in this Chronicle. As usual everyone was asked to stand up to indicate the decade in which they left school. The 1930s and 1940s each had only one representative, and only two who had left after 2010, but other decades were well represented. Several former members of staff were also present, including two ex-Head Teachers. The Treasurer, Janet Dean, reported the Society had £36.81 in petty cash, and £1,400 in the bank. The balance remains almost unchanged, despite the annual subscription being abolished, mainly because the school has not charged for the use of the hall for annual reunions, and members attending pay £5 to cover the cost of the tea provided. The Society exists to enable past pupils to get together for reunions and the aim is just to cover the costs for the day, plus postage for sending out Chronicles by post for those who wish to receive them that way.

The committee had agreed to hand over the proceeds of the raffles held at the annual reunions to the school, together with extra funds held the Society, and this enabled us to make a donation of £1,000 towards the refurbishment of the science classroom. Further support to the school can be given by a small regular donation, e.g. £3 per month, plus Gift Aid, which would be a great help. Standing Order forms were available for members wishing to take advantage of this opportunity.

There will be an Annual Leavers Assembly on Friday, 25 May, 2018. for Year 13 girls (and also for boys who have been admitted to the 6th Form since 2016). Ruth Westrip and Lucy Scully will attend on behalf of the Alumnae and hand out a school badge to each leaver. There are new GDPR rules effective from 25 May, 2018. E-mail and postal addresses are only used for forwarding Chronicles and Newsletters etc. but if anyone wishes to have their name and details removed from our mailing lists please let a committee member know. This year's speaker, **Oonagh Werngren**, **MBE** (neé Keefe) was introduced. Oonagh was at school from 1970-1977 and several of her family members also attended the school. She gave an inspirational talk about her work for BP and in the oil and gas industry, and as a promoter of careers for women. She said she first inspiration from her Geography teacher, Haresnape (also a former UHS pupil). She then attended a polytechnic and took Geology as part of a Geography unit, followed by obtaining a degree in Geology. Her uncle worked in Fiji and she helped him mapping road sections and landslides and came back to the UK with field experience. She obtained a Masters Degree at night school. Offshore drilling started in the late 1960s, but it was difficult for woman to get into this, and it was not until the 1980s that she started to work offshore for an oil company and became a technical expert in understanding drilling and production of hydrocarbons. In the 1980s and 1990s she worked for BP in the UK, Houston, and Anchorage, Alaska, then became a Drilling Manager, and for the next five years was responsible for drilling operations across the whole of the UK, Norway and The Netherlands.

She was headhunted to work in another organisation and lived and worked in France and Germany on projects all around the world. Her final job was working with a trade association for the oil and gas

industry bringing companies together to explain what was going on at a national and international level and how to move forward.

She was a successful role model, but said the glass ceiling still exists in all industries, and an inclusive culture needs to be created. In recognition of her work and achievements she was awarded an MBE in 2011.

Since retiring she has bought a pub with some friends, works mentoring women and is writing a book. Women are now educated and have the vote, so they can achieve anything they want to do and encouraged us to inspire others, because if we sit silently nothing will happen. Oonagh was presented with a bouquet of flowers in appreciation of her talk.

It is with sadness that we have learned of the passing of a number of past pupils and other people connected with the school:

Celia Rhodes (neé McDonald) died in January 2018. She
was at school from 1943-1948. Celia worked as a peripatetic
music teacher around the Havering schools, and also taught
privately. She had three sons, one a doctor, and two
musicians, who worked widely in the film industry. Celia was
a very dedicated member of the Old Girls Association, and
when it was disbanded, along with Rita Drysdale-Gordon,
became one of the founder members of the Fairview Society.

She looked after our memorabilia items for years bringing them to School every year for the Reunion, until it was decided to keep everything permanently at school.

- Stella Brown (neé Norris) on 22 February, 2017, aged 87. She regularly attended the Reunions – her last being in 2016. She was at school during the Second World War and was a lifelong friend of Sheelagh Perkins (neé Pond) and her twin sister Peggy.
- Jeanne Doris Bowman (neé Greenfield) passed away on 20 December, 2016. She was at school from 1943-1948. Her daughter, Katie Bowman, sent the following. "Her greatest friend at school was Frances Fordham (nee Johnson). Although Frances moved to Canada they kept in regular contact. Frances often visited England, always seeing mum on those visits. Sadly, Frances passed away in June 2017, just 6 months after our dear mother. We enjoyed the tales they told of their times together at school, and it was so lovely to see them laugh together at the memories. We keep in touch with Frances' husband and family.

On leaving school, mum went to The London College of Secretaries. After graduating from the College she started work with the Leather Sellers. After a few years, she then joined Scotts Baby Foods. In 1955 mum married Robert (Bob) Bowman. They met when they were 5 years old attending the Sacred Heart Kindergarten, Upminster. Three daughters followed, born in 1958, 1961 and 1964 – Maggie, Katie and Penny. After marrying, Mum supported Dad in the family business. Mum and Dad were loving grandparents to 3 granddaughters and 2 grandsons. Sadly, our father died in 1998 and Mum felt this loss keenly and forever. Mum and Dad were always the best of friends and so loving and supportive of us all. We were blessed. Mum was lucky enough to meet her great grandson who was born in May 2016."

- Mavis Reed (neé Elsom) in October 2017. This information was received from her friend Christine Tovey (neé Wash) who was at school as a boarder from 1947-1953.
- Dorothy Temple (neé Thompson) died in March 2018, aged
 84. Dorothy was a Deputy Headteacher at the Brentwood

Ursuline from 1984 until her retirement in 1993. She was said to have formed a "formidable trio" along with Headteacher Eve Ranzetta and Pastoral Co-Deputy Sister Margaret-Mary Hughes. Dorothy was a superb teacher and guided a generation of pupils through their A-level English. She was also a gifted manager of people and was a role model for the girls she taught.

Evelyn Rendle died on 11 March 2018. Miss Rendle came back to her old school to teach Maths immediately after qualifying as a teacher in 1950. The first class she was given to teach was the III Plain class in Belmont, full of newcomers to the UHS who had just passed their "11 Plus". continued to teach this class up to O-levels in 1955 and a number of mathematically gifted pupils right up to A-levels. She was a born teacher, always kind and helpful and caring, and yet with a natural air of authority which ensured that she never needed to even raise her voice to get the full attention of her pupils. She kept in touch with us throughout her life, attending Old Girls' Days for as long as she was able to and remembering our names even after her physical health necessitated her move to a Care Home. Three members of that first Maths class in 1950 were able to attend Miss Rendle's beautiful funeral service at All Saints' Church in Southend. Ann Camp writes:

"I knew her from 1974. She was such a sensible person and very kind and supportive to young teachers. I remember her with kindness and the good sound advice she gave to me which helped shape my career. She also wrote beautiful letters after her retirement and kept in touch.

May she rest in peace after a long and productive life.

Many at the Reunion will have known her. She gave her life to the Ursuline. From a child to Deputy Head she was a gentle and kind lady who will be remembered with fondness."

 Patricia Clark (neé Hollis) died in her sleep on 14 November, 2018, after being ill for some time. She joined the school in the Grange, and excelled at spoken French. She later specialised in teaching oral French and ran an

- exchange programme. This information was provided by Mary McIntyre (neé Dean). Her funeral took place on 21 December, 2018, at the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer, Billericay.
- Pauline Harvey died on 26 June, 2017. Pauline's two younger sisters, Carol and Sheila (also former pupils) survive her. Pauline was a boarder at the UHS from 1950 on. After leaving school with secretarial qualifications she worked as a Personal Assistant to a number of eminent people in the London area. She was born with a spinal deformity which was not diagnosed until much later and which deteriorated with age, and finally led to her being bedridden in the years prior to her death.
- Ruth Harrison (neé Furness) died on 11 August, 2017. Ruth was a day scholar at the UHS from 1950 on. After leaving school she qualified as a doctor and worked as a Consultant Anaesthetist in Leeds for many years. She was married and had three children. She developed Parkinson's Disease in her retirement and eventually had to go into a Nursing Home.
- Margaret Johnson died on 8 September, 2017. She came from a large Irish family and is survived by her sisters Stephanie and Patricia. Margaret was a day scholar at the UHS from 1950 on. At school she excelled at sports, especially netball. After leaving school she trained as a physiotherapist and emigrated to the United States where she received many awards for her work. She was also a very active member of her church and of various peace and justice organisations. Sadly, in her retirement years she developed Alzheimer's Disease and had to move into a Care Home where the staff admired her gentle and kind demeanour.
- Christine Tovey (neé Wash) from Walton-on-the-Naze, died in March 2018. She left school in 1953.
- We have been informed by Veronica Chadwick (neé De Largy) that Fr Anthony Harris, C.Ss.R. died on 17 April 2018. Veronica met him when she attended a three-day Silent Retreat during a half term holiday in 1958. He made a great impact on everyone who attended and anyone who was

- there will definitely remember him. It is thought that he ran other retreats for the boarders and the nuns.
- Amber Jacobs-Southgate informs us that, very sadly, she has lost many friends from her year. They left the Upper Sixth in 1995 which means that, tragically, they would only have been about 41 years old.
