Dear Parents,

It is a bad thing to wish one's time away, but I'm never sorry to see the back of January (or February, for that matter).

The easing of COVID requirements has been welcome, though the rate of infections among school-age children has remained high and testing twice-weekly continues. Many of our students choose to continue wearing masks for much of the day, as is their prerogative.

After half term we have the mocks for Years 11 and 13. The reason we do not use the word 'mock' for any other exams than these, is that only in February of Y11 or Y13 can we set a truly representative assessment, containing everything that might appear in the summer. This is the same reason why we avoid an emphasis on awarding levels or grades until we have representative data available to us.

The Mocks are located after the half term holiday to allow more time for students to do some last-minute preparation. There will be shocks and unpleasant surprises, but that's the purpose of a mock exam. Our students need to find out for themselves how much work must be done in order to be successful in the summer. I always remind them that later in life no one ever looks at their mock result, only the real thing matters. The importance of the mock grade is formative, it's a marker indicating one's strengths and weaknesses, not an end in itself.

Calm, steady and systematic preparation is the key from now until June. Students need to have a preparation plan and be willing to devote more time than they ever have before to their academic work: everything else must temporarily take second place. Working several hours at the weekend, each day over half term and during the Easter holidays may be exceptional for many students but it is the routine requirement of public exams: it has been the same since time immemorial. Time lost to COVID is, to some extent, being allowed for in the pre-release material and the cuts to exam papers that Ofqual has introduced. What those allowances cannot do is to make exams predictable, or the outcome certain: it is in the nature of exams to be the opposite; we do no favours to our students if we mislead them into thinking that they face anything different this year. Their comfort comes from knowing two things: that every other child of their age is going through the same ordeal, and that they are being prepared by teachers who have a track record of exceptional achievement for their students.

Whether you are parents who have to suffer from exam preparation this half term, or whether you have that treat in store for the future, I wish you a peaceful break.

You are an inspiration to everybody sitting here today as you took on every task with both hands and have not stopped giving your best. I speak on behalf of all the new prefects when I say that we are excited to begin our new roles and thank those stepping down for all of their encouragement over the past few months. I would also like to thank Bishop Alan for taking the time to celebrate St Angela's mass with us here today.

I hope that we can take many important lessons from everything that COVID has shone a light on. ## RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch: 28<sup>th</sup>-30<sup>th</sup> January 2022

Conserving the environment, and looking after the species surrounding us, is a key part of our Science and Ursuline ethos. At the end of January, students were encouraged to participate in the Big Garden Birdwatch. Some Key Stage 3 classes took part during the school day on the Friday and thought about ways in which we as humans are impacting on the habitat and environment that birds are living in. In 2021, more than one million people took part; all coming together to look out for birds. Shockingly, more than 38 million birds have been lost from UK sites in the last 50 years, so it really is vital that we do all we can to look after our birdlife.

Here are some top tips on how to feed and attract birds this Big Garden Birdwatch. You don't even need a garden - just a feeder attached to a window.

#### 1) **Encourage birds with food:**

There are lots of different bird foods available, including mixes for bird feeders and bird tables, as well as for ground feeding:

- Blackbirds mostly feed on the ground and will eat a broad range of foods, from fatty nibbles to mealworms.
- Blue tits and great tits use a feeder, eating seeds as well as suet and peanuts.
- Finches, including chaffinches and greenfinches, use both a feeder and a bird table, and they love sunflower hearts!



You can put your bird feeder in all sorts of places. but aim for somewhere:

- Quiet where birds won't be disturbed.
- Safe not too close to bushes where cats could hide in wait, but close enough to cover that birds can easily dart to and from
- Sheltered from harsh winds.





#### 3.) Remember the water:

Birds like to drink too. You don't even need a traditional bird bath: try a dinner plate or breakfast bowl - anything shallow that holds water will do.

#### Remember to:

- Keep it clean.
- Put out fresh water every day.
- Pour warm water onto any ice that forms in the winter, birds need water all year round.

The Big Garden Birdwatch also provides a great opportunity to stop, reflect and reset for a while; great for our mental health. We hope that the students enjoyed taking the time to get outside and appreciate nature, while also learning about the ways in which we can encourage and provide for the birds living alongside us.

The CSES team were impressed by the composition and believed the message the photo conveyed; emphasizing our dependence on fossil fuels and the need to move to low carbon transport and reduce air pollution.




The Cars' Tea Shortage' Mary, Year 10

## **Holocaust Memorial Day**

On Saturday 29th January, a group of A-Level History students, along with Mrs Cooper, Mr Earle and Miss Orritt, attended a Holocaust Memorial Event at Brentwood County High School in support of the Holocaust Survivors in Israel and the World Centre for Holocaust Research and Education.

Tikvah Chadasha Synagogue and Christian Friends of Israel ran the evening which was in tribute to Leslie Kleinman BEM and Herman Rothman; both of whom were Holocaust survivors who had shared their experiences at previous events and sadly passed away last year. During the memorial, videos were shown of Leslie Kleinman speaking about his life and teaching others the importance of solidarity and love. The event featured bookstalls as well as an exhibition titled 'Echoes of Sorrow.' These allowed us to speak to a variety of people who specialised in preserving and teaching the memory of the Holocaust and the devastating effect it had on the Jewish Community. The memorial began with speeches from the MP for Brentwood and Ongar, Alex Burghart, and the Mayor of Brentwood, Councillor Ms Olivia Sanders. Also in attendance was Natasha Radford from the 'Chicken & Frog Bookshop' in Brentwood. (All pictured below.) The group of us who attended were especially captivated by the sand artist who featured during the evening. This artist's work featured depictions of the Holocaust through the manipulation of sand which were gradually changed, mirroring the passage of time and reflecting the strength of the faith of those who had suffered.



As the memorial was organised by both the Christian and Jewish communities, the evening featured a variety of hymns and prayers in which we could participate. We spoke the Kaddish (the Jewish prayer of mourning) in both Hebrew and English to show respect for those who were killed during the Holocaust and sung both the Israeli and British national anthems. The event proved a greatly valuable experience which generated a community of support and respect. It also gave us the opportunity to write messages of hope in a Book of Remembrance, which is used at the group's annual Holocaust memorial also



For English Literature students, we also offer a wide range of literary guides.


Further, we stock a range of study skills guides to help with revision planning and ways to get organised in the lead up to exams!

## Oxbridge Virtual Workshop

On Wednesday 19th January, a member of staff from Emmanuel College, University of Cambridge, delivered a virtual workshop to a group of Year 12 students about the many university options available. This involved an introduction to universities such as Oxford and Cambridge, as well as other Russell Group Universities; as well as providing advice on super-curricular activities and the application process. One element which we really focused on was what to include in our personal statements, as this is a key part of the university application process. The top tip we were given was to ensure that around 80% of our personal statements are about the subjects we study and the super-curricular activities we complete as part of this. We were provided with lots of resources containing ideas and options for what these activities might be, across varied sub-



Besides this, we learned a range of other details about university life. We discussed financial aspects such as student loans, applying for bursaries and a fully funded foundation year. Further, we were given information about the social aspects of university like the clubs and societies available to join, work-life balance, and the college system, which many of us were unfamiliar with the details of. We all really enjoyed the workshop and it enabled us to clarify some of the misconceptions about studying at some of the UK's top universities. Due to the insights and information we were provided with, which we may have otherwise struggled to find, we feel much more confident about applying to Oxbridge and other Russell Group universities next year.
